A friend, a retired senior lecturer on international development, once told me he insisted that new students read Barbara Ward's *Only One Earth: the care and maintenance of a small planet* (1972), or her last book, *Progress for a Small Planet* (1979).

By the time the latter appeared, she was a life peer with the title Baroness Jackson (her married name) of Lodsworth, and the recipient of numerous awards. She died of cancer in 1981. Cardinal Gantin represented the Pope at her funeral.

To mark our anniversary, we have invited 50 Catholics to choose a person from the past 175 years whose life has been a personal inspiration to them and an example of their faith at its best

After school – the Convent of Jesus and Mary in Felixstowe – and Somerville College, Oxford (a first in PPE), she began a doctorate on the Austrian economy, under the supervision of Arnold Toynbee: she had once considered a career as an opera singer and had spent time in Austria improving her skills.

She was very much part of the Catholic renaissance of 1930s England and, when war came, with Christopher Dawson helped to edit *The Dublin Review* and create the Sword of the Spirit (now

Progressio). She became foreign editor of *The Economist* and was more than once sent to the US to represent British interests.

In 1950 she married Robert Jackson, the ceremony performed by the future Cardinal Heenan. She was put in charge of the Development Commission in what was then the Gold Coast (now Ghana). She began to write on development issues and was much in demand as a lecturer, at Harvard and later as a professor at Columbia University. In Rome, she helped establish the Pontifical

Commission for Justice and Peace. She would have addressed Vatican II had the Fathers not discovered that "B. Ward" was a woman.

Her focus shifted to the environment and when, in 1973, she retired to England she ran the International Institute for Environment and Development. Throughout, she retained a strong Catholic faith – she even served as president of the Catholic Women's League – perhaps bolstered by the conviction that, in the 1940s, she had been miraculously cured of cancer through the prayers of Padre Pio.


